THE JOURNEY BEGINS

VANCOUVER >>

SQUAMISH

The Sea-to-Sky Highway begins with dramatic views almost immediately, winding along Howe Sound with mountains rising straight out of the water. As you approach Squamish, the landscape becomes increasingly rugged, with waterfalls, granite cliffs and towering peaks around almost every corner.



Scenic Stop: Shannon Falls

Just south of Squamish, Shannon Falls Provincial Park is an easy stop right off Highway 99. The short 350 m walk to the base of the falls takes only a few minutes and gives you a great chance to stretch your legs without adding much time to the drive.



Recommended Eatery: Pure Bread

A great place to stop in Squamish for fresh-baked goods, pastries and something to fuel the rest of the drive.



THE ROAD NORTH

SQUAMISH >>

WHISTLER

This is where the Sea-to-Sky really starts to feel like a mountain road trip. Highway 99 winds through the Coast Mountains with huge granite peaks, alpine forests, lakes and waterfalls along the way. It's one of those drives where you'll want to keep your camera handy.



Scenic Stop: Tantalus Lookout

A dedicated roadside viewpoint along Highway 99 offering spectacular views across the Tantalus Range. It's an easy, quick stop with no hike or significant detour, making it the perfect place to pull over, stretch your legs and take in the mountain scenery.



Recommended Eatery: Ed's Bread in Creekside

The perfect stop for great coffee and organic, plant-based baked goods. The cinnamon buns are delicious!



THROUGH THE VALLEY

WHISTLER >>

PEMBERTON

Once you leave Whistler, the crowds start to thin and the scenery opens up. The highway follows the valley north toward Pemberton, with enormous mountain walls surrounding the route. As you approach Pemberton, the landscape changes dramatically into the broad Pemberton Valley, surrounded by the Coast Mountains.



Scenic Detour: One Mile Lake

One Mile Lake is a beautiful spot just outside Pemberton to stretch your legs and take in the mountain scenery. Even a quick 10–20 minute stop along the lakeshore is enough to enjoy the peaceful setting and views of the surrounding mountains.



Recommended Eatery: The Bread Warehouse

Think sandwiches, paninis, and burgers served on fresh bread, plus a pastry or sweet treat to take along for the next stretch of the journey.



THE MOUNTAIN PASS

PEMBERTON >>

LILLOOET

From Pemberton, Highway 99 climbs into the Coast Mountains along Duffey Lake Road, winding through rugged wilderness, alpine lakes, rushing creeks and rivers, towering peaks and dramatic mountain passes.



Scenic Stop: Duffey Lake

Duffey Lake Provincial Park is a beautiful roadside stop roughly 35 km east of Pemberton. It's nearly halfway between Pemberton and Lillooet and makes a natural place to stop.



Scenic Detour: Seton Lake Lookout +30 *minutes*

This iconic lookout is a 1km round-trip walk just south of Lillooet along Highway 99 and offers the famous view of Seton Lake and the dramatic U-shaped bend in the highway below.



Recommended Eatery: Lillooet Brewing Company

A great place to stop for a local beer and a bite with seating overlooking the Fraser River.



CANYON RESILIENCE

LILLOOET >>

LYTTON

Leaving Lillooet, the landscape becomes noticeably drier and more desert-like as you follow Highway 12 toward Lytton. The road winds through dramatic canyon country, with steep mountains rising above the Fraser River below. Keep your eyes peeled along the way for wildlife, including bears and bighorn sheep.



Significant Sight: The Town of Lytton

Lytton is an interesting and meaningful place to pass through on your journey. The community was devastated by the 2021 Lytton Creek wildfire, which destroyed much of the village, and the town has been rebuilding ever since.

Today, passing through Lytton gives visitors a glimpse of both the incredible resilience of the community and the dramatic landscape where the Fraser and Thompson Rivers meet. It's a small town, but beautifully situated above the Fraser River.



THE RIVER'S EDGE

LYTTON >>

REO RESORT

From Lytton, the route continues through the Fraser Canyon before turning toward the Nahatlatch Valley. The landscape becomes increasingly wild and remote as you leave the main highway behind and make your way toward REO. The final stretch is part of the adventure: winding roads, rugged forest, and eventually the feeling that you've really escaped the hustle and bustle.
